

The French Quarter

One of New Orleans' most famous districts known the world over. Much of the architecture dates from the 1700's.

At the heart of the French Quarter is Bourbon street with its collection of lively bars, restaurants and live music playing Blues and Jazz. The riverfront contains the French Market where trading in New Orleans began some 200 years ago. Throughout the Vieux Carre you'll discover antiques and art treasures to please any collector.

Directions from the Convention Center: Turn right out of Hall J and continue along Convention Boulevard to Canal street. The French Quarter is immediately behind Canal Street.

Central Business District

This the heart of corporate New Orleans. Canal street offers a myriad of department and speciality stores. The Riverwalk Marketplace at the foot of Canal Street, along the wharves house, a collection of some 140 retail establishments.

Directions from the Convention Center: Turn right out of Hall J and continue along Convention Boulevard. The River Walk is on your right and Canal Street dead ahead.

Garden District

Famous for its renovated Victorian Houses and fine shopping in the antique shops, galleries and boutiques along Magazine Street. The Garden district also house the world's oldest continuously operated streetcar established over 150 years ago.

Directions from the Convention Center: Exit from Entrance D and turn left on to Convention Center Drive. On 17th Street turn left again and walk down to Collins Ave.
