1. Message from TOS President, Alan Mix: Prepare for the Decade of Ocean Science

For many of us who live and work in the United States, this past year has been sobering. The US government has initiated withdrawal from the Paris Climate Accords, has taken many anti-science and anti-environment actions, and has proposed tax laws that will punish graduate students ([but thankfully this proposal has been withdrawn](#)). We dodged a government shutdown this past week, but there may be one in the future. TOS has been monitoring government moves that have the potential to thwart science, and has spoken out with other scientific societies when appropriate.

Graduate students I've had the opportunity to speak with recently have expressed concern about the current research climate and wondered what can be done. They asked what they, or TOS, can do to help. Surely, we can all speak up and communicate with our elected officials, we can educate the public, and we can promote rational discourse. Being realistic, this is a storm we will need to weather a bit longer.

But not all the news is bad.

A few days ago, UNESCO announced a new global initiative, the [Decade of Ocean Science for Sustainable Development \(2021-2030\)](#). This international effort recognizes that the ocean is our new global frontier. The ocean is essential to our well-being, but remains largely unexplored and poorly understood. Watch the message from UNESCO Director-General Audrey Azoulay – she explains clearly the needs and the opportunities ahead. We hope the United States joins with the rest of the world's nations in a new decade-long push to understand the ocean.

This important initiative helps to explain TOS' strategic moves to grow its membership and expand its international connections, while focusing on programs for graduate students and early career ocean scientists. We need to gear up now to be ready for the important work of the coming decade, and our energetic young scientists will lead the charge. We want to empower this new generation of oceanographers to work across national boundaries to solve the big problems we face.

To succeed at our goals, we need your help.
