### 1. Message from TOS President Alan Mix

We're hoping for a strong TOS turnout for the March for Science on April 22, 2017. In the mean time, opportunities for ocean scientists continue to emerge. Check out the request for help planning Future Earth's Ocean KAN (Knowledge Action Network). This group will help to facilitate research programs seeking solutions to big challenges such as climate change, overfishing, ocean acidification, deoxygenation, and pollution. The process will include engagement with stakeholders from diverse sectors and regions. There are already many working groups addressing specific parts of this multifaceted enterprise, but the goal of the Ocean KAN is to bring these groups together in a coordinated global strategy spanning natural science, social science, government, and private-sector perspectives. This idea has been brewing for a few years (I was pleased to attend the first planning session in 2015) but is now becoming active and is seeking volunteers to plan and implement a program.
